


WHY CHOOSE ZENDMEN TRAVEL

NATURE

Western Mongolia has some of the most spectacular landscapes as the towering Altai mountain range meets the Gobi Desert. Such unique geography provides an isolated heaven to some of the world's most exotic wildlife which includes the majestic Snow leopards, Gobi bear, lbex, and Saiga antelope – the only mammal that survived through the last ice age.

FESTIVALS

Kazakh tribes who preserve their centuries-old cultures until present day. Well known for their eagle-hunting skills, the Kazakhs organise the annual Golden Eagle Festival every October where the nomadic herders present their prized eagles to compete in some exciting hunting games. It is one of the must-see festivals in the country.

DISCOVER WESTERN MONGOLIA AUTHENTICALLY



In the culture front, both **Khoomii** singing (or throat singing) and **bielgee** dance are on the Representative List of the Intangible Culture Heritage of Humanity of UNESCO.

Khoomii singing is believed to be originated from Western Mongolia. This unique melody mimics the roaring sound of the wind that blows between Mt Chandmani Khairkhan and Mt Bumbat Khairkhan, as well as the whistling sound of the weed- grass in the adjacent Lake Khar Us caused by this wind. Another belief is when strong wind blows over the surface of the Gobi sand dunes, it emits the humming sound that is similar to the overtone singing. It is no wonder that Mongolia's throat singing is a result of imitating nature's sounds in combination of human's vocal talents and evolution of folklore.

ARCHAEOLOGY

Archaeological discoveries make Western Mongolia worth every visit. Pre-historic cave paintings of Tsenkher, petroglyph and burial mounds, all dating back 45,000 years, offer fantastic opportunity to learn and witness ancient beliefs and art.



EXPLORE CENTRAL MONGOLIA CONFORTABLY

HISTORY & CULTURE

The area is known as the epicentre of the Mongol Empire; The legendary Silk Road carried abundance of culture and artefacts to the region including Karakorum city. Nowadays, Mongolia's first Buddhist monastery (since 1586) still performs its everyday ritual. UNESCO's world heritage site of Orkhon valley preserve valuable archaeological findings uncovering mythical past of ancient nomadic empires. Yak herding nomads here produce renowned dairy, double cream, sweet curd and Mongolian cheese. Area is ideal place for those who love horses: either horse trekking or traditional Mongolian endurance horse racing or enjoying fermented mare's milk -airag.

LANDSCAPE

Dominated by Khangai mountain range (altitude 4,021m), the area is source for Mongolia's greatest rivers. Holy Mt Otgontenger is worshipped by Mongols as the first land emerged out of the sea. Summer of Central Mongolia offers Eden-green valleys, where neon-blue ribbon of rivers meander and caramel soft scent of flowers diffuses in the air. Some areas are covered full of Edelweiss flowers where you cannot find a place to walk without stepping one. The sky above the meadow is feast for the eyes. It stretched as far as eye could see in the dome of cocktail-blue, punched with fluffy clouds.



CULTURAL LANDSCAPE

Travelling to Northern Mongolia allows you to meet shamans, reindeer people in forest taiga and serene mountains. The area is best known for its crystal blue Lake Khovsgol, fresh water rivers and rocky mountains. Pre-historic and cultural artefacts and heritages include Uushigiin Ulaan deer stone monument and Amarbayasgalant Buddhist monastery, dedicated to Mongolia's holy saint Zanabazar.

TRAVEL EXPERIENCE

Making a visit to this serene and remote place may liberate you from nisvanis and offer inner peace and mindfulness. Simple and minimalist lifestyle may remind us about our temporal visit on the planet. Pleasant surprises, hospitable Mongolians may bring spice and fondness into our trips. The area attracts those who have adventure spirits for kayaking, fly fishing, trekking, horseback riding, cycling and jeep tour. Northern Mongolia is the last inhabitant for the largest fresh water fish of Taimen in the world.

WHAT IS OUR DAY OF A COMFORTABLE TOUR LIKE?

Our tours are designed to travel with as much as comfort possible for the route with limited driving hours. There are up to three people in 4x4 drive jeeps. Travelling in Mongolia often involves long distance driving.


We usually set off around 9 am after having leisurely breakfast and travel until the next lunch stop at 1pm with en-route intermissions at planned visit sites. For a group trek (up to 12 people), tour crew with a kitchen van travel ahead to make sure to set up camp site and prepare meals before travellers arrive. Camping toilets with a doomed tent and seats are set up for ladies and gentlemen separately. In remote mountain regions, a bowl of warm water for washing and hot drinks are provided early in the morning.

If the day's driving takes longer or little beyond the average distance, we bring lunch boxes for enroute stops in beautiful scenery. Dinner is an important meal of the day in Mongolia, where we get together briefly for 15-20 minutes afterwards to discuss the day's highlights and things we could possibly consider to make the journey enjoyable experiences for a every single member of the tour family.

Ger camps provide comfortable single or double bed as per guest requested. We will sleep on a comfortable mattress in a duvet with bed lining with an extra woollen blanket on top. Unless you requested a single supplement, there will be double in a **ger**. We use mainly en-suite **ger** which is equipped with a private bathroom. There will also be a traditional fire stove in the **ger** which is used to warm the **ger** up in the evening and early in the morning. If it is too cold, a **ger** attendant will light a fire in the middle of the night if you request before going to bed.

At night, Mongolia usually offers a pitch dark sky with thousands of stars. If you are a star gazer, this is the best time to spend your time outside. Mornings can get chilly even in summer, as there is relatively high temperature fluctuation between day and night.







NOMADIC EXPERIENCE

A nomadic homestay offers a genuine glimpse into Mongolia's traditional herding lifestyle, with families hosting guests in gers across the country. Located in scenic areas, often near nature reserves, these stays allow visitors to feel at home with a welcoming herder family who hosts guests in a cozy, warm ger (Mongolian yurt) equipped with comfortable beds.

Guests are welcomed with seasonal Mongolian meals and have the opportunity to participate in the family's daily life, gaining insight into the nomadic way of living and animal herding. Partnerships between local tour companies and host families promote responsible tourism, fostering empowerment and bringing sustainable benefits to these rural communities.

WINTER FESTIVALS MONGOLIA

Winter festivals of Mongolia are truly magnificent travel experience for this winter: Ice Festival, Golden Eagle Festival, and Thousand Camel Festival. Horse sledging on the frozen Lake of **Khovsgol**, ice sculptures created by mother nature, tranquil setting of snow-covered wilderness setting will definitely take your breath away. Golden Eagle Festival offers tournaments testing agility and speed of hunter Eagles.

Hunting with eagles is very much an ancient tradition of the Central Asian nomads that is still kept alive in Altai Mountains in Western Mongolia today. Throughout the journey you will come across prehistoric rock engravings and the ancient Turkish stone men 'balbal' which witness the passing of Mongolia's rich history.



NAADAM FESTIVAL AND KHUVSGUL LAKE TOUR

Enjoy Naadam Festival in Khatgal village at the shore of Khuvsgul lake. This is a great opportunity to witness Mongolia's enduring long-distance horse race, traditional wrestling, archery, and knuckle-bone shooting tournaments. The trip is even fantastic to be organised near the breathtaking freshwater Khuvsgul lake in Northern Mongolia. Khuvsgul lake is the deepest in Central Asia. Spend your holiday trekking in the mountains, cycling through Alpine meadows and shoreline of the lake.



THE GOBI DESERT TOUR

Join us for a journey through the Gobi Desert's ancient mountains, green glens and sand dunes, against a backdrop of blue sky by day and a star-filled sky by night. Nowadays, there are two tribes in eastern and western taiga. Once declining reindeer herd is growing steadily. Hunting and reindeer stocking is basis of their unique nomadic culture. Gobi refers an arid land with sparse vegetation in
Mongolian while desert is synonym to barren land.
One third of Mongolia's vast territory may be classed
as **gobi**, of which some stretches to north western
Mongolia. Southern Mongolia is mostly dominated

by arid **gobi** and steppes. Annual precipitation

sometimes as low as 50 mm.

CUISINE & CULTURE

Silk road, Tea road would not be possible without legendary camel caravans. At present, Mongolian provinces with camels celebrate annual Camel festival including camel race, camel polo and camel caravanning tournaments. Camel drink is well known for its medicinal quality. Oscar nominee documentary, "Tear of the Whipping camel" tells the customs, ritual and the way of life in the Gobi without exaggeration.

ART

Vastness of Mongolia's steppe may be associated with the origin of its long song and horse headed fiddle. Mongolia's traditional wedding ceremony begins with series of long songs and traditional praises. Recent success of Mongolians at BBC Cardiff Singer of the World, biannual opera singers' contest in the UK, could possibly be rooted Mongolia's traditional and throat singing. In 2017, two Mongolian singers were shortlisted the final 20 of whom Ariunbaatar Ganbaatar became a joint winner of the Song Prize via singing 'The Steppes of Mongolia' by composer Sharav.





The founder of the Mongol Empire, Chinggis Khan, was born and brought up in the region and united all Mongol tribes under his leadership to lead to form the largest known land empire in history. Holy Mt Burkhan Khaldun is worshipped by all Mongols.

LANSCAPE & WILDLIFE

Eastern Mongolia is one of the last steppes of Central Asia where thousands of steppe gazelle roam. Siberian great taiga stretches to Khentii Mountain range which meets eastern Mongolian steppes to the south. Some of Mongolia's best race horses and grand wrestling champions are from the region. Undulating hills, rolling steppes where foals grow to catch up their elders' phase to the nearest water sources for watering (at least 20-30 km) while building up their stamina at young age. Thus, Galshar horse breed became a much valued for Mongolia's endurance horse race.

PEOPLE & CULTURE

Inhibited by various ethnic Mongols, among them Dariganga people are renowned for their silversmithing. Nowadays, brilliant silver bowls, horse saddles, jewellery are well sought after items across Mongolia. Eastern frontier of this vast country is trimmed by Khalkh river, a name for Mongolia's dominant ethnic group too. In the region, Ikh Burkhant, the largest on ground Buddhist statue erected in the XIX century.

ANNUAL **NAADAM** FESTIVAL

Well, **Naadam** literally means playing game. Each administrative region in Mongolia celebrates **Naadam** Festival after or before the State **Naadam** Festival (11-13 July).

Upon Mongolia's revival of independence in 1921, Naadam Festival became the celebration of independence. There are 512-1024 wrestlers in the wrestling tournament while 6 different age categories of horse races take place.

Archery tournaments consist of three styles including Buryad, Uriankhai and Khalkh named after by three ethnic groups respectively. Each archery tournament has differing styles of shooting, distances and accessories. Also there is knuckle bone shooting tournament takes place in which competitors shoot animal knuckle bone to hit a target whilst seated.

Naadam Festival commences with a colourful opening ceremony with staged performances and parade. The opening ceremony of the Naadam Festival is the grandeur in its sheer size and could be most attractive for international visitors. If you are unwilling to join a large crowd, district and provincial Naadam offer very personal experiences of meeting local wrestlers, jokey children and archery athletes.

EXOTIC WINTER FESTIVALS IN MONGOLIA



Located in the Bayan-Olgii, the westernmost province of Mongolia, this magnificent mountain range is home to unique species of alpine animals such as Argali sheep, ibex, red deer, moose, snow leopard and golden eagle. Bordering with China and Russia, Bayan-Olgii is inhabited largely by Muslim and Kazakh communities, and houses Mongolia's highest peak, the Khuiten Peak, which stands at 4,374 m above sea-level.

Summer makes a wonderful visit to experience one of the most dramatic natural landscapes Mongolia can offer. Besides the snow-capped peaks, travellers are also greeted by glaciers, deep lush valleys carpeted with myriad of flowers, alpine lakes and hospitable eagle-hunters. Horse riding is perhaps one of the best forms of transportation to get around the region. Riding through the rugged and yet untouched terrains makes one feel like Aragorn in The Lord of the Rings.
